Accomplishments





The planning process for the Corporate Strategic Plan began in 2015 with the four Strategic Priorities – *Economic Innovation, High Quality of Life & Caring for all Citizens, Responsible Financial Management and Corporate Excellence & Leadership* – agreed upon early in the planning process. We have back-casted to summarize accomplishments in 2015 and 2016 that align with the four Strategic Plan priorities, undertaken with the support of Council and the community.

Road reconstruction projects are a complete rebuild of underground services, curb and gutter, sidewalks, catch basins and storm sewers as well as new pavement. Sewer and watermain projects replace select underground services and involve new pavement to an existing road.

In many cases prior to development proceeding, a change in land use permission must occur. This is done by planning application which involves a public process and final determination by Council or Committee of Adjustment, and in some cases the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB).

 Rezoning, Official Plan Amendment and Draft Plan of Subdivision – Sifton Properties Limited, Modeland Road and Michigan Avenue, all referred to the OMB for final determination

- Sarnia Fire & Rescue was driving force behind the <u>Lambton Hoarding Coalition</u> in 2015
- Sarnia Fire & Rescue achieved compliance with Provincial Regulations regarding Vulnerable Occupancies involving annual fire inspections and drills at approximately 30 vulnerable occupancies.

Vulnerable occupancies include retirement homes, nursing homes and care facilities.

Working towards growing and diversifying revenues:

- Adopted new Advertising & Sponsorship Policy
- Awarded sponsorship of the Sarnia Sport & Entertainment Centre to Progressive Auto Sales and renamed to the Progressive Auto Sales Arena (PASA)
- Entered into 10-year agreement with Compass for Food & Beverage (F&B) service at PASA with Compass investment of \$300,000 in capital upgrades to F&B facilities at PASA



- Introduced civil marriage ceremonies at City Hall (2016)
- Introduced E-Bingo to complement the traditional paper-based bingo
- As a major shareholder, Council authorized the Board of Bluewater Power to develop an affiliate, Bluewater Regional Networks to provide fibre-based communication network services to the industrial/commercial/institutional sectors in Sarnia
- In 2015, the Planning Department ran at near cost recovery only requiring \$9,940 from the general operating fund
- In 2016, the Planning Department contributed \$64,987 to the general operating fund

- In 2015, 138 Building Permits were issued for new dwellings with a construction value of \$73,572,753. Revenue from permits amounted to \$659,763, achieving a cost recovery model with revenues matching expenses.
- In 2016, 189 Building Permits were issued for new dwellings with a construction value of \$103,399,405. The permit revenues amounted to \$888,054.
- Entered into agreement with Bell Mobility Inc. to allow Bell to attach telecommunications equipment to City owned facilities; collected fees totaling \$4,000 (2016)

Foster Financial Sustainability:

- Retained AON Reed Stenhouse Inc. as the City's insurance provider at an annual savings of approximately \$1 million (2016)

LED Streetlight Improvements Project:

- Replacement of mercury vapour and high pressure sodium (hps) to LED cobra head streetlights; from 2015 to 2017 approximately 4,725 streetlights were replaced, with approximately 275 remaining
- Savings resulting from this project: \$125,000

- 189 Building Permits in 2016 exceeded the 30 year average (163) and median (137)
- In 2016, the Planning Department processed 141 applications up 12% from 2015
